

APPENDIX 1

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

Southend Council inherited the resources and staff for the Connexions service in 2007/8. It was a very well funded service, having been grown over previous years under a national strategy. Southend integrated the Connexions service with the Local Authority Youth Service with a vision to support, empower and challenge all young people to reach their full potential. It was primarily concerned with supporting young people's personal and social development and their social inclusion.

Given the significant resource capacity we were, at that time, able to organise the service into three integrated locality teams. Each locality team was led by a Local Services Manager supported by an Assistant Local Services Manager, supervising Personal Advisers, Youth Workers, Youth Support Workers and Administration Staff which was in excess of 70 staff with a budget of £2,866,546.

In 2011, *Positive for Youth* a new approach to cross-Government policy for young people aged 13-19 in England was published. It brought together all of the Government's policies for this age group, presenting a single vision across the interests of at least nine departments. *Positive for Youth* sets out a shared vision for how all parts of society, including councils, schools, charities, businesses, can work together in partnership to support families and improve outcomes for young people, particularly those who are most disadvantaged or vulnerable.

The strategy recognises that disadvantaged and vulnerable young people, including those in care, those with disabilities, and those struggling in education can be at risk of poor outcomes and that they need additional and early help to overcome the challenges they face.

The Positive for Youth Strategy believes that raising young people's aspirations and attainment is the most important thing for helping them reach their potential. Therefore, it determines that services have three main roles:

- (i) to make sure young people at risk of dropping out of learning or not achieving their full potential engage and attain in education or training;
- (ii) to prevent crime and risky behaviours such as teenage pregnancy and substance misuse which can undermine young people's life chances and have a cost to wider society; and
- (iii) to provide opportunities for those who don't otherwise acquire them to develop the personal and social skills and qualities they need for learning, work and transition to adulthood. These skills include self-regulation, relationship-building, and decision-making.

In respect of Myplace Centres, Tim Loughton further wrote to Directors of Children's Services in summer 2011 urging them to realise how Myplace Centres can contribute significantly to the three determinants of the Positive for Youth Strategy outlined above by:

- providing opportunities for those who don't otherwise acquire them to develop the personal and social skills and qualities they need for learning, work and transition to adulthood
- ensuring young people at risk of dropping out of learning or not achieving their full potential engage and attain in education or training and
- preventing crime and risky behaviour such as teenage pregnancy and substance misuse which can undermine young people's life chances and have a cost to wider society

He also stated how as well as delivering publicly funded services, the Centre has the potential to act as a hub for the engagement of voluntary, community and private sector partners in the provision of support for young people.

In light of the Positive Strategy for Youth and in response to cuts to public services, The Integrated Youth & Support Service (IYSS) was formulated and agreed by cabinet in 2011 as part of the budget savings considered by Cabinet on 1st March 2011 (Minute 836 refers). The reduction of 24.66 posts included the loss of 4 full time youth worker posts, 2 trainee youth worker posts and 98 hours of youth support work and 7 personal advisers. The remaining posts were management and infrastructure staff.

POST 2011

Since April 2011 therefore, with the inception of IYSS, the vision has been to develop a new and innovative approach to the way the services are delivered around the needs of hard to reach and vulnerable children and young people whilst maintaining those services that clearly already meet such a need.

Unlike some areas who cut all youth provision, Southend has maintained 3 youth centres to provide local authority youth work for those with targeted needs (i.e those most vulnerable children) whilst at the same time exploring new ways of working in a more innovative way to achieve more for less. This has included seeking to maintain the universal element of youth provision by increasing the volunteer base at centres and encouraging the community to use the centres for community based activities.

Charging for the hire of facilities and rooms at centres was also built into the model in order to achieve sustainability. The model had, and still has income generation targets which are met thus funding some of the services staffing base. Many authorities including neighbouring authorities chose to close some or all of their universal youth provision.

In addition work continues in partnership with Neighbourhood Policing Teams to deliver street based outreach where and when it is most needed by targeting areas with a high level of public concern about youth disorder with the overall aim to signpost young people to more positive activities using a triple track approach of challenge, support and enforcement.

Likewise, the Service has identified children, young people and families difficulties before they have reached a point at which the children's development and well being is seriously compromised, tackled public perceptions of anti-social behaviour by maintaining a high visible presence in hot spot areas and attended all Neighbourhood Action Panels which enable communities to have a say in where and when work is deployed across the borough.

At the April meeting, the Working Party requested:

1. That a breakdown summary of the activities/services available, together with a breakdown of the costs of running each youth centre, including staffing costs be provided
2. That a survey of young people be undertaken to indentify the following:
 - which activities/services are used;
 - what other activities they would like to see provided;
 - why they do not use the services/activities that are currently provided;
 - any barriers/difficulties to accessing activities/services;
3. That a mapping exercise of the activities and services currently available to young people in the Borough be undertaken.
4. That Councillors Hadley and Assenheim consult with representatives of the Youth Council on the areas above
5. That the details of the deployments of the street engagement workers be circulated to the Members of the Working Party.

The information that follows has been formulated to address the above actions and to provide details to allow members to consider the future of youth work provision moving forward into 2013/16 in the context of the continuing savings the Council are required to make from 2013 onwards.

The Working Party will in turn make recommendations to Cabinet on the future provision of youth services across the borough of Southend.

CURRENT DELIVERY:

Youth work now consists of :

- 1 Manager
- 3 full time youth workers
- 1 full time Young Carers Worker
- 12 part time youth support workers
- 1 part-time (30hrs) Positive Activities Worker
(with the latter two being a total of 5 FTE)

Provision is targeted at those young people who are:-

NEET/Young carers/Children With Disabilities/Youth Offending/Teenage Pregnancy/Young people with drug/alcohol issues/Young people at risk of crime/ASB/poor outcomes

Youth work programmes are offered at the following locations:

Focus Youth Centre – 5 programmes – 5 days per week – Tuesday-Saturday

Cluny Youth Centre – 5 programmes – 5 days per week – Tuesday-Saturday

Shoebury Youth Centre – 11 programmes offered (including young carers) 5 days per week – Tuesday-Saturday

The Outreach youth work utilises community volunteers to run sessions with the assistance of one youth support worker in the following locations:

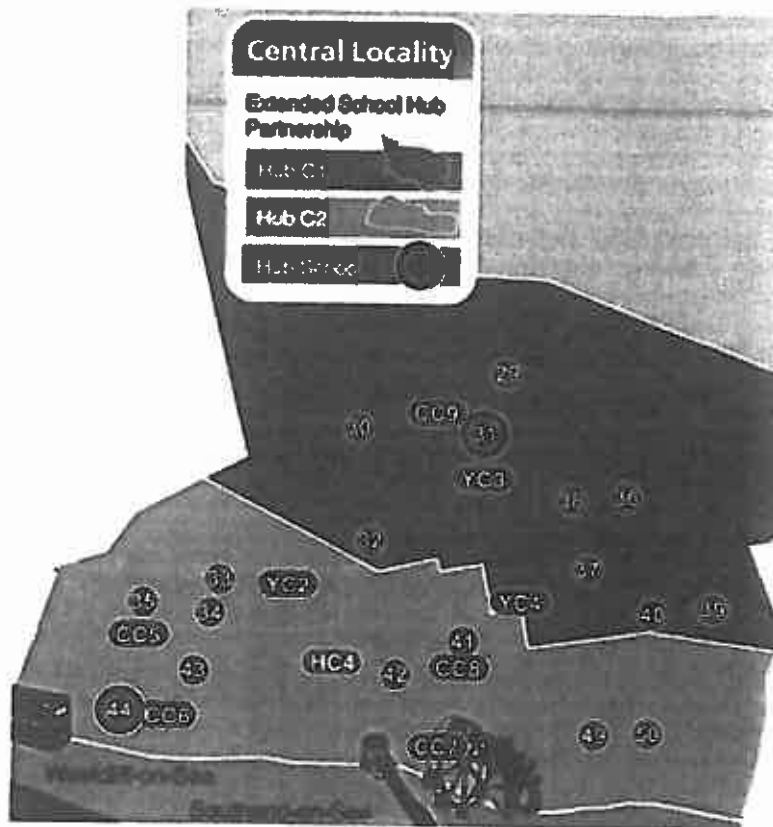
St. Stephens - 2 programmes offered (Juniors/Seniors) on Thursdays

Woodgrange Centre Place - 2 programmes offered (Juniors/Seniors) on Wednesday

Both centre and outreach sessions run during term time and school holidays. In addition, daytime activity programmes for young people aged 10-14yrs are also provided during all school holidays across the borough both in centres and local parks/community places with referrals for young people to attend these programmes coming predominantly from schools, social care, IYSS and Child and Family Panels.

Youth work programmes aim to:-

- Engage vulnerable and hard to reach children & young people in meaning activities and positive use of leisure time
- Reduce anti social behaviour in this locality and community
- Reduce youth criminal activity
- Integrate local communities
- Promote a positive profile for young people in their local communities
- Increase young people's self esteem, confidence and team work skills
- Ensure activities are based on young people needs following appropriate participation.

A large amount of young people using Focus centre are known to Youth Offending and Street Engagement who, whilst on patrols in Southend, direct young people to the centre to facilitate positive use of leisure time.

Popular activities are:

Football, basketball, badminton, dance, pool, table tennis and table football.

There have been some problems with behaviour and attitudes towards the building and staff but youth workers have slowly built relationships with the young people and incidents have reduced. Some of the issues covered have been:-

- Sexual health (informal workshops – undertaken Chlamydia tests)
- Anti social behaviour
- Respecting others
- Work with the President of the Symbioza Gypsy Organisation of Southend who has visited the centre on several occasions with an interpreter to talk to the young men attending the programmes.

This centre is predominately attended by males however staff are proactively working with young women around setting up a "chill out area" for them to sit and talk about issues that are affecting them. They have also requested some nail art and jewellery making equipment which is now on offer to them.

A music project funded through Raw Roads came to the centre early 2013 and produced a music/DVD and a show at the Clifftown Theatre. Workshops with one of the performers have subsequently followed.

Young people are regularly asked their views on the programme and what other activities they want at the centre and primarily they have wanted a place to meet friends, relax, undertake sports activities and partake in music lessons.

The Centre is also currently the base and offices for the Care management 16+ team and used by the Prevention Team of Youth Offending to run the Intensive Activity Programme for young people who have offended or at risk of offending to engage them in Positive Activities to divert them away from Anti-Social Behaviour. This programme runs Monday-Friday with the focus of the work during the afternoon after school.

Areas for development:-

- Further work with the Roma community – this will be delivered with the Streets Ahead Community Workers – starting Summer 2013.
- Closer working with the Kingsley Ward Centre regarding young people's Sexual Health
- Music workshops
- Provide more targeted activities for young women who attend the centre.



Cluny Square:-

The programmes run from this centre are very different to the other centres due to its strong community ties. Programmes run Tuesday to Saturday afterschool and in the evenings.

Popular activities are cooking and IT (this centre has an extremely high quality apple mac computer suite) sports in the park involving a football coach from SUFC and other coaches brought in to deliver other sports activities e.g. cricket.

There is good community engagement in the centre with currently 6 members of the local community working as volunteers on various programmes. Likewise the youth work team support various events facilitated by the residents association over the year e.g. Fun Days/Christmas Parties/Easter hunts.

Work with the Sexual Health Team and YPDAT is delivered on a regular basis

St. Lukes Youth Community Challenge (SLYCC) which was originally developed through Motivate the Estate is continuing to work on young people's community issues and the young people attending this programme have undertaken some training with a Community Leader on "Appreciative Enquiry" an adult programme which was adapted for young people. The group are now working alongside the local residents association in partnership and are involved in the summer Cluny Fun Day event.

There are also close links with Temple Sutton and Cecil Jones Schools.

The centre is also utilised by the Streets Ahead Community Team who organise meetings with local community members and are currently running art workshops in the centre on a Monday for parents and children.

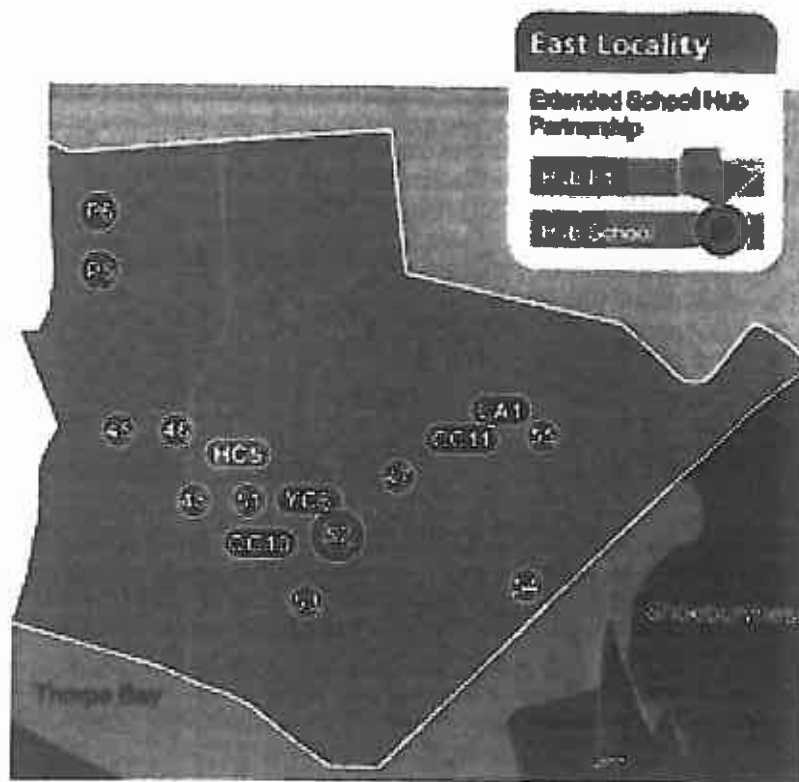
Areas for development :-

- Work with young people, Streets Ahead community worker and residents association in putting together joint events.
- St. Luke's allotment site involving a joint partnership working with St. Luke's allotment/IYSS staff, volunteers and young people in growing and producing fruit and vegetables to sell to the community – (starting summer 2013).
- Training events for young people e.g. Food Hygiene/First Aid (as requested by young people) first events planned for Summer 2013.

This programme was set up by IYSS and Estuary Housing after a consultation period of outreach by the youth workers whereby young people requested a youth club on the estate. Both Junior and Senior group's run on a Wednesday evening. The targeted youth service team manager sits on the centres steering group panel and meets regularly with Estuary Housing staff to monitor the progress of the programme.

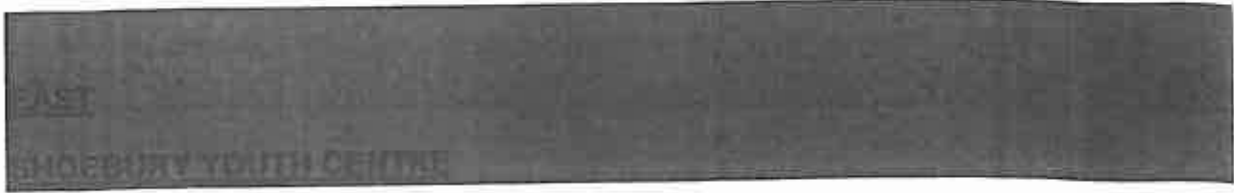
Areas for development:-

- Developing a D of E programme with the seniors attending the centre and citizenship work with the juniors
- Partnership work with the Streets Ahead Community Worker on events with the whole community.
- Young people have requested trips to various other centres e.g. Cluny and Shoebury Youth Centre

Popular activities are:-

Football with an FA coach, climbing wall with trained qualified instructors, dance with dance instructors, music studio, cooking sessions and use of the IT/Media room. Other activities include pool, games room, Street Art project and the garage/workshop.

The centre is also open to various community groups – scouts, local knitting group, SHS basketball and a universal youth group which supports transition from Junior to Senior school run by Youth Work Direct and supported by IYSS staff.

The Renown has had a group of young people attend alternative education Monday to Friday.

The centre is the base for the 3 young carers groups:-

Sycamore Group – 5-8yrs this has recently started at the centre (January 2013) and numbers are slowly building

COOL – Caring Over Our lives – 8-13 yrs

CHIL – Carers Have Independent Lives – 13-18 yrs

These programmes are specifically aimed at young carers delivering various activities for them to take part in and providing an opportunity for young carers to take “time out” of their caring roles.

The centre is also the base for a disability group called Club Ink, the under 18's attend Thursday 5.30-7.30 and over 18's attend Thursday 8.00-10.00p.m. Both sessions have a mix of young people attending with physical/learning/developmental disabilities. An independent consultant (Ability Action Southend) was brought in during 2012 to ask young people what they want at their group and the programme was changed to provide these activities.

The local PCSO's also attends various youth clubs when they are available to give young people the opportunity to see the police in a different environment and build positive relationships with them and youth workers.

Shoebury continues to be challenging with the amount of rooms staff and volunteers have to cover during a session but a positive set of programmes and good relationships built on informal/social education are progressing well.

Areas for development:

- Work with Growing Together on their newly acquired site in Elm Road with staff/volunteers and young people (Summer 2013)
- D of E to commence with young people attending Club Ink – this will end with a camping residential in spring/summer 2014 (funding applied for) – commencing September 2013.
- A Teen Cafe on a Saturday evening with delivery of workshops around keeping safe on a Saturday night e.g. sexual health and drugs/alcohol awareness are also delivered from this centre.

Shoeburyness Youth Centre Steering group:

Following concerns that the facility was not being used to its full potential and the existence of a diversity of opinion concerning the way forward it was decided to establish a steering group of interested persons who would take responsibility to formulate actions to maximize community use and involvement in the centre.

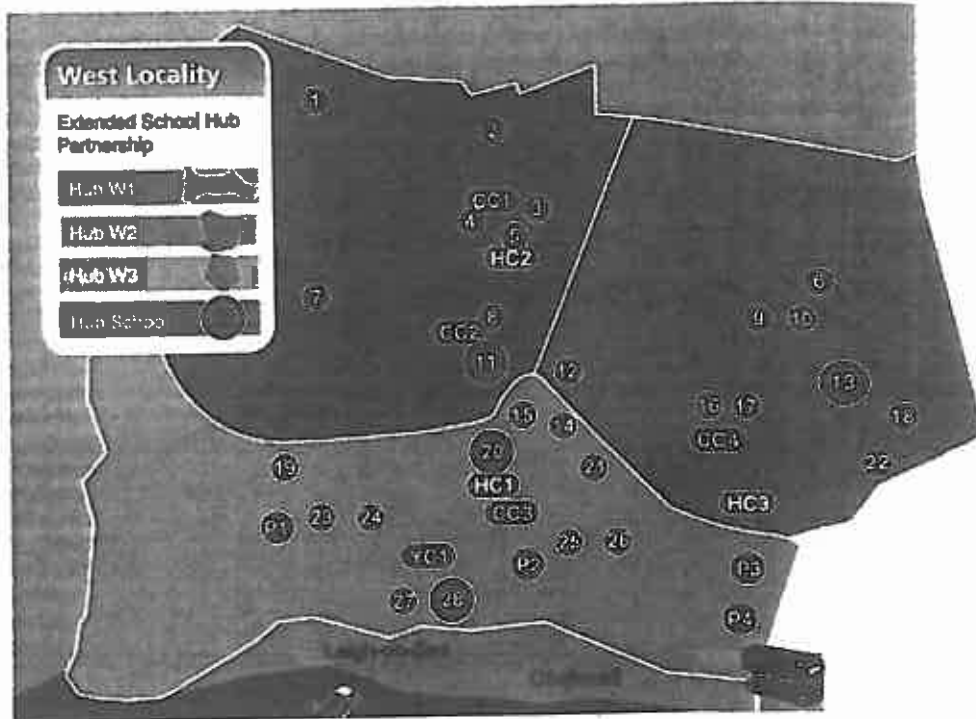
The group first met on the 6th December 2012 when the meeting was chaired by an independent party. Agreement was reached that the meetings should be open to the wider community to enable continued assessment of local needs and opportunity for personal involvement and that the group would help support or steer any actions from Southend Borough Council's Scrutiny Meeting or requests from the community to ensure the best possible usage for the Centre.

The Meetings have been held at 4-6 week intervals with the following focus:

1. To develop / increase the use of the centre by young people and the wider community.
2. To increase the income.
3. To manage links and to promote partnership working and use of the centre in response to needs of the local community.
4. To provide advice and information for the future use of the centre in the context of wider youth service reviews.
5. To be the first point of call regarding concerns / ideas from the community.
6. To focus on the long term future of the centre.

The steering group has been successful in ensuring that all the actions highlighted on the initial plan (Appendix 2) were completed prior to submission to the SBC Scrutiny meeting on the 8th April 2013 and are currently working toward the following:

- Development of the cafe menu – to incorporate wider choice and thereby increase customer numbers. Implementation of staff skills development to facilitate the creation of a training resource within the kitchen area.
- Upgrading the ICT systems to include WI-FI and current software with the intention of increasing facilities rental and encouraging increased community use of the café.
- Improved publicity to highlight the multi usage of the centre.

St. Stephens is led by the church and volunteers with support from an IYSS youth support worker and manager support when required.

There are 2 sessions run on a Thursday Juniors and Seniors which are both building in numbers and popular to local young people.

The Team Manager has delivered youth work training to the volunteers working at St. Stephens and other training is offered regularly to them.

Areas for development:-

- During the winter of 2013 St. Stephens Church/hall will be demolished and a new building established. Alternative arrangements have been made to ensure that the current youth work provision will continue with the young people by providing a service from Prince Avenue School.
- Offer more outreach programmes across the West Locality e.g. other side of A127 (Eastwood) – Mendip area.

ALL CENTRES & OUTREACH

It should be noted that regular consultation takes place with young people at all youth centres and outreach facilities in respect of the different programmes they are offered and what they would like to be included in future programmes.

There are a total of 36 volunteers working across our youth centres and outreach projects with a further 37 currently going through the process of training to become a volunteer within IYSS. This will bring our total number of volunteers within IYSS to 109

SCHOOL/EXTENDED SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Shoeburyness High School

- provide a holiday club for both the Easter holidays and the first four weeks of the summer holidays through the Extended Schools programme.
- provide a transition programme for the last 2 weeks of the summer holidays for the new Year 7 intake.
- provide a variety of different activities after school: basketball academy; Achievement Plus Clubs this includes Forest School, film club, homework club and ukulele club; various textiles clubs; French and Spanish clubs and an ICT club.
- The Extended Schools programme also provide after school activities: fencing, gymnastics, martial arts and two youth clubs – the 5 o' Clock Club and The Living Room. They also provide adult activities such as Slimming World, Zumba fitness and a Job Club

Chase High School

- offers a free summer school programme for pupils and their younger siblings, which has been extended this year to offer places to pupils at Earls Hall primary school
- They also have a wide range of extra-curricular activities: the choir; athletics, gym, cricket and football clubs; various creative and media clubs including animation club and graphics/resistant materials; drama club; dance crew; enterprise and community business studies clubs; history club and science club.

Cecil Jones College

- provide a variety of extra-curricular and after-school activities, ranging from homework clubs to sports, music and performing arts.
- There are no summer holiday clubs or activities.

Futures Community College

- have a summer holiday programme
- lunchtime clubs such as music, sports, media etc;

NATIONAL/REGIONAL PRACTICE

Youth work service provision across the region is as varied as the National picture. Some Local Authorities continue to offer a 'universal' service, whilst others have moved to a 'targeted' provision.

A large number of Local Authorities have developed a similar structure to Southend, by developing an Integrated Youth Support Service. Where the integrated model has been implemented, the focus has been primarily on targeted provision, with a specific aim of engaging hard to reach young people who are more often than not at risk of poor outcomes, youth crime and antisocial behaviour. Local Authorities, generally appear to recognise that under the previous Connexions structure, this group were marginally represented and whilst the numbers of young people attending centres have generally increased under the IYSS models, there remains a significant majority of young people with targeted needs that still choose not to access centre based activities.

The national debate looks to continue as to whether the best way of reaching young people with targeted needs is through detached outreach work. There have been a number of studies that have explored detached work in terms of both its effectiveness and value for money. Such models of delivery are of particular interest given current financial pressures. Furthermore there has been wide debate with regards to the prevention agenda and preventing universal needs developing into targeted needs.

Some Local Authorities appear to continue running a generic service that delivers a mixture of the two, based on a spend to save principle. Where there is commitment to universal services, however, Local Authorities are being asked to reinvest in both equipment and refurbishment of centres.

The London Borough of Redbridge is an example of a local authority operating an Integrated Youth Support Service very similar to the model here in Southend in that it is made up of the Youth Offending Service, Connexions Service, Targeted Prevention Service, Teenage Pregnancy, Youth Service, Young Person's Substance Misuse Service, with the added services of Education Other Than At School, Music Service and a Drama Centre.

Likewise, in April 2012 they established a Youth Services Working Group to consider the future direction for the Youth Service within Redbridge, albeit their review also considered the Connexions Service. Whilst members of the Working Group were deeply concerned about the cuts to youth service provision, they recognised that:

- If existing provision was to be maintained, further funding would need to be provided
- there had to be increased collaboration with the voluntary and community sector for the provision of youth services
- Further outreach work was needed in order to meet the needs of the borough

1. Introduction

During May, June and July 2013 young people currently using the targeted youth provision were consulted on their views about the Youth Service provision.

The purpose of the survey was to capture and analyse young people's views on the way that the targeted youth service is provided, what facilities and services the young people access and where they would prefer the service to be provided.

A total of 573 young people completed the survey and the results are provided as numbers and percentages. Not every young person answered every question. For each question we have given the number who did and where we give percentages these are percentages of the people who answered that question. For some questions, children could give more than one answer, so the percentages add up to more than 100.

Throughout the document we have used word clouds to display the comments. A word cloud is a graphical representation of word frequency, the larger the word the higher the frequency that the word was used by the consultation respondents. The full responses are set out in appendices 1 – 4.

2. The Children and Young People who took part

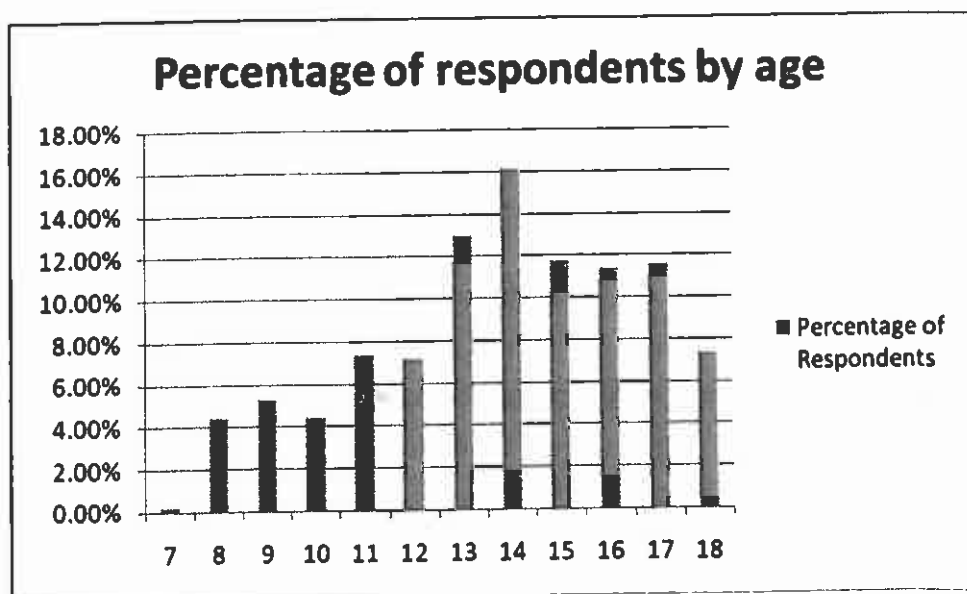

6. Why don't you go to a youth centre?

Only respondents that said that they did not use a Youth Centre responded to this question. Respondents were asked to respond to a free text question to explain why they didn't go.

Older respondents seem to feel that there would be lots of younger people at Youth Centres and they didn't wish to hang around with younger people. Many people just didn't know why they didn't go, some people felt that as they couldn't go with their own circle of friends that they wouldn't enjoy it, they would rather be with those friends in other locations.

Reasons given by male respondents included comments about being outside skateboarding, that they don't know of any, or have tried them and don't like them and just don't want to go to a club because they feel they are boring. 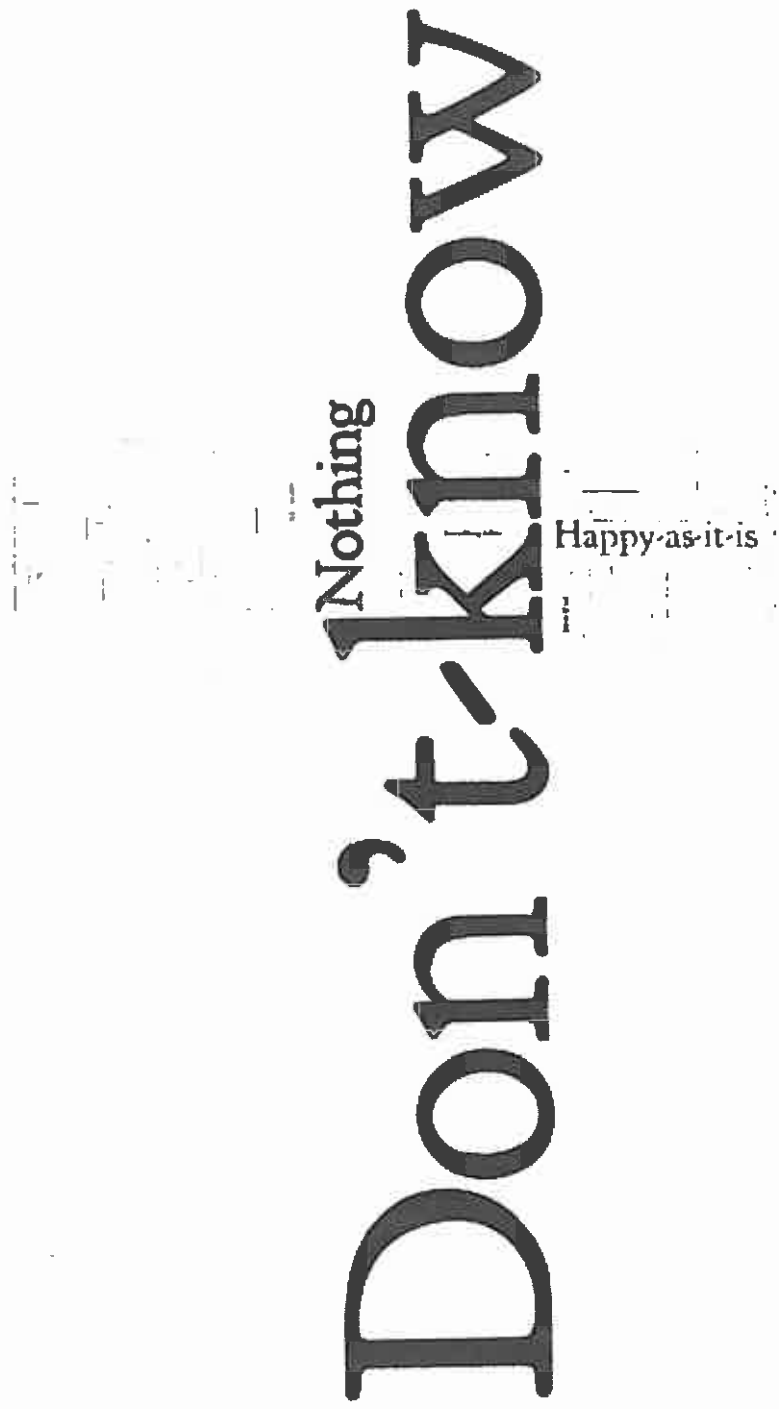
