#### Southend on Sea Special Education Needs Profile 2013

#### 1. Introduction

School census data has been used for each of the last 5 years to build a profile of what SEN (Special Educational Needs) looks like in Southend. Any national data that has been used was sourced from the Department for Education Statistical First Release of the relevant year.

#### 2. Prevalence and Characteristics of Special Educational Needs

Over 5 years the overall number of children that attend Southend schools has increased by 3.9% from 26,828 in 2009 to 27,926 in 2013 (Figure 1). This includes reception class to year 14 children. The proportion of children that are recorded as having a SEN that attend Southend schools has decreased over the last 5 years by 1.8% from 5,177 in 2009 to 4,896 in 2013. Figure 2 shows the percentage of children at each of the stages of the SEN code of practice. Children with a SEN include those with School Action 'A', School Action Plus 'P' and Statemented 'S'.




#### 3. Proportion of children with SEN

Table 1 shown below, provides the overall the proportion of children in Southend with SEN. Although there has been some volatility over the past 5 years, generally Southend's proportion of children with SEN has been below the national level, with the decreasing national proportion being mirrored in Southend. The chart in Figure 3 shows this downward trend.





#### 4. Children in their School phase with a Special Educational Need

Figure 4, below, demonstrates that approximately 11% of all children with Special Educational Needs in Southend are educated in a Special school and this level has very slightly increased in the last 5 years. Figure 5 splits the maintained schools by phase, and this shows that there has been a very slight increase in SEN at Secondary schools overall and a decline in levels at Primary schools. The detailed numbers of children with each type of SEN by school phase have been provided in Appendix 1, Table 7.

The chart below shows that just over 50% of children with statements of Special Educational Need are educated in Southend are educated in a Special school. It should be noted that this includes children not resident in Southend but attending education in Southend.



#### 5. Category of need

Children who are classified as being at the School Action Plus or Statemented stages of SEN are given a further classification of their specific type of SEN. This is called a *category of need*.

Appendix 2, on page 15, provides a key of category of SEN needs; this will explain what the acronyms in the subsequent tables mean. Table 4 below gives prevalence of SEN pupils by each category of need for the last 5 years. Table 5 provides equivalent national figures and Table 6 provides the Southend number equivalents in order to add context to the prevalence as some numbers are very low.

The significant points from these tables are;

- Southend has a much larger proportion of children with MLD (moderate learning difficulties) than national (16% higher). Due to the weight of this, this means that Southend has lower levels in most of the other categories.
- Southend has a much smaller proportion of children with SLCN (Speech, Language and Communication Needs) 9.6% which is almost half the national average.

With regard to trends an item that stands out locally is a 5.6% drop over 5 years in MLD. In Southend this category has been reducing at a much faster rate than the national trend.

Largest increases have been in BESD (Behaviour, Emotional and Social Difficulty) and ASD (Autistic Spectrum Disorder). Both of these categories remain generally in line with the national levels.

#### 6. Children attending Special and Maintained schools


Figure 7 below provides more detail on the children that are classified at the higher end of the SEN scale (those that are School Action Plus or those that are Statemented). The first chart shows the category of need for those children attending Special Schools from 2009-2013. The second chart shows the category of need attending Maintained Schools over the same period. The two charts have marked differences reflecting the different needs that are catered for in both school types.


In mainstream schools the category of need is predominantly BESD and MLD whereas in Special Schools the predominant needs are spread much wider with higher levels of ASD, BESD, and SLD.

In maintained schools the proportions of children in each category of need has not changed significantly over the last 5 years. Whereas in Special Schools there is a greater variance and a noticable increase in BESD.




#### 11. Destinations of pupils subject to a Learning Difficulty Assessment.


Section 139A of the 2000 Act places local authorities under a duty to arrange for a LDA to be conducted for all persons in respect of whom they maintain a statement of Special Educational Needs and who they expect to leave school at 16-19 to receive post 16 education, training or higher education.

At the end of the last academic year 100% of young people eligible for an LDA, received one. Each LDA had a clear recommendation of educational provision and the support each student would require to achieve a successful outcome. It is recognised that our current system of tracking young people with LDD up to the age of 25 needs to be improved and discussions are underway to integrate Education, Health and Care Plans into the existing Capita system.

#### 12. Compliance with Statutory Requirements

<u>Numbers and percentages of statements completed within statutory timescales with and without exceptions</u>

The table below shows that the number of statements completed per calendar year has doubled since 2009. Statements are required to be issued within 26 weeks unless there are valid exceptions, such as school holidays or late reports from health or social care. While most years all statements without valid exceptions were issued within 26 weeks, the overall number of statements issued has increased significantly since 2011. While a greater number of statements have been issued within 26 weeks, the overall percentage of all statements issued within 26 weeks has fallen.
