There is only 1x3 bed house at LHA rates advertised on Rightmove for example. We are in discussion with a landlord to see whether SBC could lease 22 flats which could be used to offer good quality Private Rented properties at LHA rates which will assist in meeting this target.



A number of new initiatives are being rolled out during September in order to support with the management of absence such as early OH referral process, and a new absence monitoring system.
