# Objections to Traffic Regulation Orders Southbourne Grove, Westbourne Grove and Rosary Gardens Executive Councillor: Councillor Waite A Part 1 Public Agenda Item

# 1. Purpose of Report

For the Traffic and Parking Working Party and Cabinet Committee to consider objections to advertised traffic regulation orders, and make an appropriate decision.

# 2. Recommendation

- 2.1 That the Traffic and Parking Working consider the objections to the order and officers comments as detailed in Appendix 1 of this report.
- 2.2 That the Cabinet Committee consider the views of the Traffic and Parking Working Party in respect of the objections and

# 3. Background

- 3.1 Following the expiry of an experimental Order which prohibited parking for part of the morning and afternoon in Westbourne Grove and Southbourne Grove, Members agreed to the advertisement of permanent Orders designed to maintain the existing prohibitions. As part of the process an adjoining street had also requested proposals to resolve parking difficulties.
- 3.2 The permanent Order was advertised in September 2009 and the objections detailed in Appendix 1 of the report received.

5.1 To maintain existing prohibitions, which have proved successful in deterring all day parking by local workers.
