#### 1. Purpose of Report

For the Traffic and Parking Working Party and Cabinet Committee to consider objections to an advertised Traffic Regulation Order, and make an appropriate decision.

#### 2. Recommendation

In the event of either 2.2.1 or 2.2.2 being agreed to authorise the making of the Orders as advertised, or amend to reduce the impact, as appropriate.

#### 3. Background

3.1 Following an informal consultation with residents Members agreed to formally advertise a Traffic Regulation Order to create a Parking Management Scheme (PMS) in the Colchester Road area. Following advertisement we have received a number of comments objecting to and supporting the proposal. Comments

are summarised in Appendix 1 of the report and copies of all comments received have been available for inspection in the Members room.

- 3.2 The majority of residents are in favour of controls to relieve the parking stress in the area however local workers who use the area to park have expressed concern at where they will be able to park for work. We are able to advise employers on implementing green travel plans for their staff and the area is very well served by public transport. Parking is available near to the area at a charge and those wishing to park in the PMS area are able to purchase a parking permit should they choose to do so.
- 3.3 Comments regarding potential difficulties for the nearby school have also been raised in connection with parents dropping off and collecting children however we have met with the Headteacher who is eager to set up a walking bus for pupils.
- 3.4 It is appreciated that the scheme will remove free parking for local workers however, the residents are seriously disadvantaged and often experience difficulty in parking near to their homes. The scheme will undoubtedly remove this frustration.
